November is upon us!

We start out with the time change. Please remember to turn your clocks back before bed Saturday night, Nov. 6th. Our liturgies will offer a variety of moods and subjects this month. Nov. 7th we will celebrate All Saints Sunday. The Gospel passage from John's Gospel is about Jesus raising Lazarus. Please see the article on page 4 for more background on this important feast of the Church. We will remember by name our family and friends who have died since November 1. 2020.

On November 14th the Old Testament and Gospel lessons for Proper 28 are descriptions of the end times. That theme of apocalypse is always heard at the end of the season after Pentecost bridging over into the first Sunday of Advent.

On November 21st, the Last Sunday after Pentecost, we will celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. It will also be our Ingathering Sunday, when we will bless the pledge cards received with our commitments for 2022. Please remember to bring your card in on a Sunday, or mail it to the office.

November 28th is the First Sunday of Advent. The Gospel from Luke has Jesus again speaking about the end times. November 25th is, of course, Thanksgiving Day. We are people of the Eucharist, which

Vestry Meeting Summary Sunday, October 17, 2021

Approval of Minutes:

Minutes of the September 26, 2021 meeting were presented, reviewed and a motion was made to accept as written with amendments.

<u>**Treasurer's Report:**</u> Snapshot of financial status was presented and reviewed. The Vestry unanimously accepted the August Report as presented.

Action Items

Update from Senior Warden

Discuss 2020 insurance claim – Jeff Adair provided an update about the tree incident on the eastside of the Parish house. Received email and letter this past week that the insurance coverage check was being mailed. Lyle will get new roofing estimates for the Parish House and will see if it covers fascia repair. Jess Shirley is getting estimates for painting the exterior trim and fascia repair. *Lawn Maintenance 2022* – Jeff will talk with Forest, lawn maintenance person, and thank him for all he has done, see if he wants to continue in the same capacity, cut back, or stop altogether. Considered if Forest continues mowing and leaf blowing, we could contract with a service in Spring 2022 for trimming and tree/ shrub maintenance. Vestry agreed to continue with additional work days with members volunteering to maintain the church grounds. Will revisit after Jeff talks with Forest.

Discuss Vestry rotation and recruitment – Most years only two people rotate off the seven-member Vestry. However, every third year three members of the Vestry rotate off. This year Jeff Adair, Roberta Charbonneau and Daniel Bennett are rotating off. Now is the time to take nominations. Vestry members are nominated at the November Vestry Meeting. Those nominations are taken to the parishioners at the December service to be voted on. Nominations from the floor would be accepted too. Share any other nominations with Jeff or Rev. Linda by the first Sunday in December

Report from the Priest in Charge

Update on Stewardship campaign – Rev. Linda's sermon on the 10th was about Stewardship, giving of your time, talent and heart. She is preparing a letter to our Parishioners. Kerry has the pledge cards printed and the envelopes are ready. All will be mailed out.

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-Rev. Linda has considering annual meeting placement within service - lasting no more than 8 minutes. -Rev. Linda and Kathleen Shirley have been working together and experimenting with the disposable cups and cruets for the possible return of wine during the Eucharist.

-After discussing with Louise Purdy, Rev Linda cancelled the pumpkin carving - only one family would be attending. Rev. Linda will try to plan a family event for November.

-Rev. Linda is still looking into sponsoring a family from Afghanistan. She will also be contacting the Episcopal Migration Ministries, as well as our local ministerial group.

-Rev Linda reported that everyone on the Vestry, except Jeff and Daniel who completed it last year, need to take Safe Guarding God's People and Safe Guarding God's Children. She has a link that she will send regarding registering.

Report on Church Workday – George Trudell reported that it was a success and the six people that showed up worked very hard. Shrubs and trees were trimmed. He suggests a work day four times a year starting in 2022.

Discussion regarding current / protocols

Registration and seating, Service Size and Social distancing, Virtual Recording and Facility Sanitizing. * Volunteers <u>needed.</u> – Still no additional volunteers for sanitizing so Jeff and Lyle will continue to rotate every other week for now. We started the alternating Sunday worship schedule in September with plans to revisit and decide if we were to continue after November 7th. Vaccination rates are low for Gordon County and the local hospital is overflowing. Decided to continue the alternating schedule with an open-ended date.

Facilities Update

Potts house fence still needs repairs. George will work on getting all supplies needed to fix it, then set another work day. Also, the top bar of the chain link fence around the playground needs to be fixed, they will take care of this at the same time. Jeff reminded us that the water heater had been turned down in the kitchen at the start of Covid—cost savings.

Committee Reports -

Outreach – Terry Overlander shared information for St. Timothy's Annual Giving Tree. The theme she has chosen is 'Help a Child have a Purr...fect Christmas'. Terry requested a virtual request be sent out to everyone on November 8th. She will place the tree in the narthex on November 17th and 24th. All gifts must be returned to her on/before December 5th. They can call her to arrange pick-up.

Worship – Jeff reminded us that with Advent and Christmas approaching we need to decide how to handle this. Rev. Linda will talk with our musicians first. She is thinking of doing three services for Christmas Eve Day, evening, and midnight to accommodate our members within the regathering protocols that we have in place.

Each week after our Sunday Service, a thorough sanitizing is completed. This is done in accordance with the current CDC



Collect for All Saints' Day Almighty God, you have knit together your elect in one communion and fellowship in the mystical body of your Son Christ our Lord: Give us grace so to follow your blessed saints in all virtuous and godly living, that we may come to those ineffable joys that you have prepared for those who truly love you; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, in glory everlasting. Amen All Saints' Day, celebrated November 1 or the nearest Sunday afterward, is characterized by the Book of Common Prayer (BCP) as a Principal Feast, "taking precedence over any other day or observance" (BCP, 15). The day is set aside to remember and commend the saints of God, especially those who are not recognized at other points in the church year.

According to Holy Women, Holy Men, in the tenth century, it became customary to recognize on a single day "that vast body of the faithful who, though no less members of the company of the redeemed, are unknown in the wider fellowship of the Church" (Holy Women, Holy Men, 664). Over time, the day became associated with special remembrances of an individual's family and friends.

While several churches abandoned the commemoration during the Reformation, the Feast of All Saints was retained on the Anglican liturgical calendar. All Saints' Day began to assume the role of general commemoration of the dead: all Christians, past and present; all saints, known and unknown.

Because of the day's association with the remembrance for the dead, many churches publish a necrology. This reading of the names of the congregation's faithful departed may include prayers on their behalf. Such prayers are appropriate, as the Catechism reminds us, "because we still hold [our departed] in our love, and because we trust that in God's presence those who have chosen to serve him will grow in his love, until they see him as he is" (BCP, 862).

The day is often characterized by joyful hymns, including such favorites as "For All the Saints," "Who Are These Like Stars Appearing," and "I Sing a Song of the Saints of God." These hymns share motifs of rest, fellowship, and continued, joyful service to God—salient indeed on this day, as we remember "those of dazzling brightness, those in God's own truth arrayed, clad in robes of purest whiteness, robes whose luster ne'er shall fade"!
