Dear St. Timothy's Folk There are things happening at St. Timothy's in October, in spite of COVID Delta. On Sunday, October 3<sup>rd</sup>, we will celebrate the Feast of St. Francis with a Blessing of the Animals. (See the article elsewhere in this issue.) Pets must be leashed, or in carriers or containers. Please note that we will also do virtual blessings for pets who do not enjoy social interaction (I will bless photos, or even just names) and stuffed animal pets are welcome as well. The liturgy takes about 15 minutes depending on the number of critters. Snacks and treats will be handed out. I can also offer drive-through blessings for a short time after the liturgy. On Sunday, October 24<sup>th</sup>, we plan to have a Family Pumpkin Carving event. This will also be a planning meeting for our youth group – we will invite them to work at one table so they can talk about when they would like to meet, and what activities they want to schedule for the next few months. Look for more details about time closer to that date, but probably 2:00 or 3:00 p.m.

## Vestry Meeting Summary Wednesday, September 26, 2021

Meeting called to order: at 2:06 pm led in prayer by Rev. Linda Baker Pineo.

<u>Minutes</u> of the August 22, 2021 meeting were presented, reviewed and approved unanimously by\_acclamation..

<u>Snapshot of Financial Status</u> was presented and reviewed. Jeannie reported that "the church is in order and financials look really good." The Vestry unanimously accepted the August Treasurers Report as presented.

Jeff thanked everyone on the vestry team starting with the Easter service up to now for the work we have put in to our in-person regathering. He appreciates how everyone has worked together to make our church services successful.

### Report from the Priest in Charge:

Last Sunday Bill Anderson's ashes were interred. A service was held in the church with the family due to the weather. Father Louis did the Homily. Thanks to Kathleen for changing out the altar hangings; Lyle for bringing his canopy to put over the garden area; and Daniel and Lyle for doing a great job of closing the site. The family were very appreciative.

Next Sunday, 10/3, at 2:00 pm will be the Blessing of the Animals in the playground area. An email announcement will be sent to congregation. (See page 4.)

Bishop Wright approved a couple possible methods to add the wine back in with the Eucharist service: wine infused wafers or the use of small biodegradable disposable cups. After discussion the vestry decided in favor of the small cups. Parishioners will have the choice to take the wine when offered or pass.

In the process of getting Wi-Fi installed Linda spoke with Jess Shirley who had talked with Josh Briones about our live stream situation. Josh stated to that we would need to get a matrix board, a camera that zooms and a microphone. Josh offered that if we purchase the board, he would donate the camera and microphone, and train people to use the board. The board uploads directly to the internet. The cameras we have now are not designed for live streaming of a large service. After discussing the pricing and various options, the vestry approved unanimously the purchase of the master board from memorial funds. For the donated



equipment, his travel, as well as time in installation and training, the vestry approved compensating Josh for travel expenses.

Our new six-month goals were sent to Bishop, Canon Alicia Schoster-Weltner, and Canon John Thompsons Quartey, and received positive responses.

Salley Ulrey from the Office of Congregational Development offered to meet with the vestry at our October 17<sup>th</sup> Vestry meeting to talk with us about a new tool that works with our local demographics.

Regathering protocols were discussed. Feedback received from many of regular attendees is that, for now, they like the alternating Sunday schedule. They appreciate the feeling of not being so crowded and having opportunity to social distance. Rev. Linda will do a reminder about usher guidance for communion and for leaving the service. Also, when leaving service, to leave immediately, go out the doors, down the ramp or stairs. If you wish to talk on the sidewalk that is okay. Discussion was also brought up about "regulars", a person who is on a every other week alternating schedule, wanting to see if a seat is available on their opposite week if they want to attend. The current schedule allows for non-regular attendees and visitors to register and have opportunities to come when they are able. After discussion the vestry made the decision was that regular attending members only attend on their pre-established alternating Sundays. The reasoning was that if family had family or friends visiting that they want to invite at the last minute they could, also this would allow a new visitor to our church to attend and possibly become a member. We still need volunteers to help with sanitizing the building after service. Roberta will put in the parchment again with a note the volunteer position is only once a month.

<u>Stewardship Campaign</u>, Rev. Linda will send out a letter to the Parish with a pledge card. She will do one sermon per each alternating schedule in October. She will talk with Jeannie before setting a date for ingathering and blessing pledges in November.

<u>The 115<sup>th</sup> Diocesan Annual Council</u> will meet Friday and Saturday, November 12 and 13th virtual via Zoom. Delegates Roberta Charbonneau and Jeff Adair have been registered. Since Roberta can only do Friday, Daniel Bennett has agreed to be the alternate delegate for Saturday. Rev. Linda will see that he is registered.

The January 2022 Vestry Retreat Zoom will be January 22, 2022, from 9 am – 3 pm. Canon John Tomphson Qartey will provide leadership.

A <u>Work Day</u> for the church has been scheduled for Saturday October 9<sup>th</sup> beginning at 9 am. George Trudell and Lyle Currier will coordinate this. It is agreed that shrubs need trimming, fence needs fixing, parking lot needs to be repaired, . We need to make a list of what needs to be done, what tools we need so people can come prepared. George and Lyle will work on the list. George will take care of getting lunch and will turn in receipts for reimbursement.

George suggested that we look into sponsoring a family from Afghanistan. Everyone thinks it's a good idea and the vestry supports this endeavor. Roberta noted that other churches were involved when a family from Serbia was sponsored in the past. Rev. Linda will talk with the diocese and the local ministerial group.

Louise Purdy has contacted several past leaders but has been unable to find a Youth Group leader. Our youth and their families are wanting to be in a youth group. We are continuing to search our parish for youth leader volunteers. While looking, we will do a kick off to reorganize our youth group with a family pumpkin carving in October. Also, find out from the youth how often they want to meet and what they want to do. Information on the family pumpkin carving event to follow.

<u>Facilities Update</u> provided from Lyle. Jess and Lyle replaced florescent panels above the altar and the lights still didn't work, so, an electrician was called in to replace the ballast. While he was there, he also ran wire/ conduit and put in an outlet box in the cry room. This will better accommodate any new tech equipment we might need and provide a lower outlet for Kay Baxter's oxygen machine.

Roberta reported that the Daughters of the King (DOK) have not met for nearly two years. The group cannot/don't want to meet via Zoom, but prefer to meet in person. Rev Linda said they can meet in Parish Hall or Library (depending on size) if no food or drinks are served. They can bring in food/drink for themselves, but need to wear masks and social distance.

so to produce a better video for you when you are watching from home or when traveling.

October is the beginning of Stewardship season. We exercise Stewardship in many ways throughout the year, but this is the time of year when we prayerfully consider our pledges of time, talent, and treasure for the coming year. Expect a letter from me with a pledge card enclosed later this month. The ingathering and blessing of pledges will take place in November.

On the subject of Communion: we are still not able to offer the chalice, the common cup, for sipping or intinction. BUT we will now be allowed to provide consecrated wine in the following manner. A cruet of wine will be consecrated on the altar, as we would normally do to provide wine to refill the chalice, or to fill a second chalice. After the consecration and fraction, the cruet will be used to pour a sip of wine into small individual cups. These cups are disposable, biodegradable and compostable. The Lay Eucharistic Minister will follow the priest and offer each person an individual cup from a tray. Receiving or not receiving a cup of wine is completely a personal choice. Some will choose to partake, some will choose to receive only the bread – the entire sacrament is present either way. At the end of the railing will be a receptacle for the empty cups, which will be disposed of appropriately. We will begin this practice soon, and I will send out an email to alert you, but at the moment I am still working on the logistics and - practicalities, as well as conferring with the Altar


