Dear St. Timothy Folk,

Two thirds of Lent is behind us. Ahead are Palm Sunday/ Sunday of the Passion, Holy Week, and Easter. I suspect that we long for Easter after most of Lent much the same way most of us long for spring toward the end of the drearier weather of winter.

We will observe the Fifth Sunday of Lent on April 3rd. Then on April 10th, we will begin by celebrating Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem and transition during the service to the more solemn recitation of the Passion story. Maundy Thursday will be our remembrance of the institution of the Eucharist, and Good Friday we will hear again of Jesus' betrayal, trial, and crucifixion from the Gospel of John. Walking through these stories prepares us for the wonderful good news of Easter: Christ has conquered death, and we share in his Resurrection. I encourage you to participate as much as possible, either by attending services, watching online, or reading through the prayerbook, and reflecting on the story of our salvation.

Maundy Thursday – 7:00 p.m.
- Holy Eucharist Rite II and stripping of the altar

Vestry Meeting Summary Sunday, March 20, 2022

Present: Lisa Dunbar (Senior Warden), Lyle Currier (Junior Warden), Dan De Guire, Terry Overlander (Secretary), Rev. Linda Pineo, Louise Purdy, George Trudell, Beth Vaughn, Jeannie Vaughan (Treasurer). **Absent:** Jess Shirley, Devon Smyth (Deacon Postulant)

Meeting called to order: at 12:51 pm led in prayer by Rev. Linda Baker Pineo.

Approval of Minutes: Minutes of February 13, 2022 meeting were presented, reviewed, amended and approved.

Treasurer's Report: Jeannie Vaughan stated that finances are looking good, not great. Pledges are still coming in. Contributions are still low; these are the monies that are not pledges There is still \$36,788 in the building fund. She does not see any red flags at this time. The Vestry accepted the Treasurer's Report and approved unanimously by acclamation.

Action Items

- Since the previous meeting the following items were approved via email by the Vestry by a majority: Tree Removal donation use, Chasuble from undesignated memorials, Parochial Report and change in protocols: masks optional on right side, masks on left side with social distancing.
- Scholarship follow-up – Lisa looked up the original outline for those who receive scholarship money. It stated that it goes to youth that serves in the church. The vestry agreed to continue this to include serving the church as Crucifer, Acolyte, A/V, usher, Lector, workdays, Parchment contribution etc.
- Updated the check request approver for the Facilities Committee.

Parochial Report : Rev. Linda reported that last year's Parochial report listed 200 active members when we have about 120. She will continue to work on updating

the church register.

AED/Fire Extinguishers: reviewed progress from last month.

Overall Maintenance: We received the maintenance list from Dale Seger and will review along with a repair list from Lyle Currier at the April Vestry meeting.

Deacon Postulant: Rev. Linda and Devon Smyth have discussed monthly dates in which she will preach. Her first sermon will be March 27th.

Afghani family: George Trudell reported on information from the "Neighbor to Neighbor" group which would require a large monetary and time commitment. Rev. Linda will contact the Ministerial Association and nearby Islamic centers to see if anyone locally is supporting a family and see if we can assist. She will also check on whether any Atlanta Diocese congregations are doing anything.

Committee reports

Facilities Update: Approved Building Fund and 2020 Fundraiser monies to be spent on painting the Parish House (\$6200). Approved Building Fund monies be spent on the replacement of the Parish House roof (\$10,000). Approved from the Building Fund the down payment for replacing windows in the Parish House (\$4700). The cost of each window is \$550. This includes the window, installation, and taxes. There are 17 that need replacing. There will be a campaign for the windows asking parishioners to "purchase" a window. They can have a plaque placed under the window with their name and designate; in honor or in memory of someone. Please note "Windows" on donation checks. The plaques will be made by Mike Davis. The condition of the fence surrounding the playground was discussed. Lyle Currier will get quotes for regular chain-link fencing and vinyl coated chain-link fencing.

Other Committee Reports/Discussion

Christian Education: Louise Purdy mailed Lent lessons to the youth.

Parish Life: Indoor coffee hour was discussed and will be starting March 27th. All three outside Parish Hall doors will be opened open for air ventilation. Kitchen Improvement fund monies were approved to replace the coffee pot, if needed.


Good Friday





The Outreach Committee met on March 16th. We approved the budget and to pay the following:

- \$100 to Emmaus House, they work to prevent family homelessness by providing safe and sustainable housing, neighboring support, and professional guidance to families in need.
- \$200 to the Episcopal Relief and Development: they facilitate healthier, more fulfilling lives in communities struggling with hunger, poverty, disaster and disease
- \$150 to Episcopal Sex Trafficking Victim Assistance: to help them continue to give assistance to victims of sex trafficking
- \$100 to Diocese of Cape Coast: they give support in the education and healthcare of the West African people
- \$100 to Episcopal Community Foundation: they help to lift up people facing poverty and oppression, creating sustainable impact for individuals, families, and communities.
