Dear St. Timothy Folk,

Happy Eastertide! Look on page two for a short article on Eastertide found by the Editor. All of May falls into this season which is central to our liturgical and theological life. Every day of Eastertide is a reminder to us that Easter is not just a single day, but a season and a way of life. For the disciples, the Resurrection of Jesus was not a moment in time, an event, but an ongoing reality that changed everything. As Jesus was the central relationship in their lives, the Resurrection was at the core of their proclamation of Jesus as the Son of God. who had raised Jesus from death to eternal life.

That is our proclamation as well, in the words of the Creed and woven through the words of our liturgy: "Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again." In this season, we sing it with energy and joy. "Jesus Christ is Risen today!", "He is risen, he is risen!" "Christ is alive! Let Christians sing!" are just a few of the hymns we use in this time. Following the ancient pattern of the Church, we encourage standing for prayer in place of kneeling as a recognition of the gifts of forgiveness and new life we receive through Christ's death and Resurrection. We also omit the Confession for a time for the same reason. (Please remember that sitting may replace standing if your physical body objects to standing too long. Standing is "as you are able" – God cares more about the posture of your heart than the posture of your knees.)

Also part of this season is the Feast of the Ascension which takes place on the 40^{th} day of Easter. According to Acts 1:3, Jesus appeared to

Vestry Meeting Summary Sunday, April 24, 2022

Present: Lisa Dunbar (Senior Warden), Lyle Currier (Junior Warden), Dan De Guire, Kelli De Guire (Secretary), Rev. Linda Pineo, Louise Purdy, George Trudell, Beth Vaughn, Jess Shirley, Devon Smyth, **Absent:** Jeannie Vaughan

Meeting opened with prayer by Rev. Linda Baker Pineo.

Approval of Minutes: Minutes of March 20, 2022 meeting were presented, reviewed, and approved.

Treasurer's Report: Jeannie Vaughan communicated that finances are still looking good and has asked if there are any upcoming large expenditures since we have been spending building funds on the Parish House and not all windows in the Parish House have been sponsored. The Vestry accepted the Treasurer's Report and approved unanimously by acclamation.

Action Items

- Since the previous meeting, the following item was approved via text: Replacement of the playground fence by Gordon Co. Fence Company. \$2300 will be used from the Building Fund on a black vinyl coated chain link fence. This should be installed by mid-May.

- The Vestry approved spending an additional \$1258 for roof repairs on the Parish House.

- Discussed May calendar and revised volunteer sign-up sheet for the Parish Hall

Report from the Priest-In-Charge: Rev. Linda reported that Easter service attendance was 76.

- Intinction permission just came recently from the Bishop. In fact, we can go back to the Common cup. Procedures were discussed for how to implement the cup. Linda proposes that we put the tiny cups in the middle on a table and have 2 cups

(one for intinction and one for sipping).

-Discussed Diocesan required training for the Vestry. Safeguarding (Children and People) are module classes at your own pace. Dismantling Racism is a 1-day training online (Zoom). Linda will ask about getting an in-person class for our convocation.

Committee reports -

Facilities Update: Reviewed completed work on the Parish House and discussed interior wall repair and painting for the Parish House and the Parish Hall. Jess will get an estimate. Lyle reviewed a list of repair items to be included in the next work day. Vestry voted to end regular COVID sanitizing of the facility.

Christian Education: Louise Purdy has ordered Easter and Pentecost lessons for the youth.

Parish Life: Vestry approved starting Parish-wide events. This would include Graduate Celebration May 15th as well as Friday Night Sound Check June 3rd, and First Sunday Brunch June 5th. These will include options for those who wish to physically distance. There will be a memorial service for Janie LeQuire May 7th at 11 am.

Communications: Publish the public Wi-Fi codes for the facility. Committee will meet May 1th at coffee hour.

Meeting adjourned and closed in prayer by Rev. Linda Pineo.


As announced a few weeks ago, the Vestry is focused on repairing the Parish House. Exterior wood repair and painting are underway, and the roof has been replaced. We have ordered replacement windows which will make the building more energy efficient. The Vestry is accepting donations to help purchase the 17 windows. Each window costs \$550 which includes sales tax and installation. The Vestry will provide each sponsored window with a plaque designating the donor and any dedication requested. We currently have 12 windows sponsored and 5 more available for sponsorship.

The Easter Season takes place from April 17 till June 05, 2022. Easter Season, or Eastertide, Paschal Time, Paschal Tide or Paschaltide, is a festal season in the liturgical year of Christianity. It is the period of fifty days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost Sunday.

The Easter Season is celebrated as a single joyful feast, indeed as the "great Lord's Day". Each Sunday of the season is treated as a Sunday of Easter, and, after the Sunday of the Resurrection, they are named Second Sunday of Easter, Third Sunday of Easter, etc. up to the Seventh Sunday of Easter, while the whole fifty-day period concludes with Pentecost Sunday. the disciples for forty days prior to his bodily ascension into heaven. Since this means it always falls on a Thursday, it is often not celebrated on that day in smaller churches (unless they happen to be Church of the Ascension), but is acknowledged on the following Sunday, sometimes called Ascension Sunday. The Feast of the Ascension ranks with Easter and Pentecost as being recognized across all Christian denominations.

The three days preceding Ascension have traditionally been observed as Rogation days. "Rogation" comes from the latin rogare, meaning "to ask", and was understood as beseeching God to protect from calamities. This observance goes as far back as the fifth century. The faithful typically observed the Rogation days by fasting and abstinence in preparation to celebrate the Ascension, and farmers often had their crops blessed by a priest at this time. In churches in England, and some churches in our country, a common feature of Rogation days in former times was the ceremony of beating the bounds, in which a procession of parishioners, led by the minister, churchwarden, and choirboys, would process around the boundary of their parish and pray for its protection in the forthcoming year. The preceding Sunday is known as Rogation Sunday, and in some places has been observed as the church version of Earth Day, with prayers for agriculture, industry, and the environment. 
