Dear St. Timothy Folk,

As we start 2023, I suspect we have some contradictory feelings. We may have optimism about the new year, but that is tempered with some skepticism and caution, especially with Covid, flu, and RSV in the air. And then there is the usual wondering what Mother Nature is going to throw at us for weather...

Liturgically, it is also a bit mixed. We are beginning a new secular calendar, but we are halfway through the school calendar year. We are midway through the twelve days of Christmas, still celebrating the Incarnation, with Epiphany and the season of Epiphany in view. Sunday, January 1, is New Year's Day on our secular calendars, but it is a major feast on our church calendar. January 1 is celebrated as the Feast of the Holy Name of Our Lord Jesus Christ. When it falls on a Sunday, it takes precedence over the First Sunday after Christmas. It falls on Sunday only every 6 or 11 years (because of leap years). It last fell on Sunday in 2017, but the next time will not be until 2034. Prior to the 1979 Book of Common Prayer, it was called the Feast of the Circumcision. It commemorates the eighth day after the birth of Jesus, when he would have been circumcised and named according to Jewish law and practice. The title of the feast was changed to reflect the emphasis on the name of Jesus, which reveals his nature and ministry. In Hebrew, Jesus is

Yeshua, which means "Yahweh saves". This feast also reminds us that from his birth Jesus experienced ordinary human life.

On the following Sunday we will hear Matthew's very brief report of Jesus' Baptism, which is always celebrated on the First Sunday after the Epiphany (January 6). During the rest of January we hear about Jesus calling his first disciples, and the beginning of his ministry and preaching. As we reflect on these Gospel stories we are invited to ask how Jesus has been and is being revealed to us in our lives. Christmas, the Nativity, is only the beginning of the story of Jesus for us. How does the story continue and connect with our own stories? If we proclaim Jesus born in Bethlehem, how do we also acknowledge him as the Son of God proclaimed at his baptism? This idea of revelation and proclamation will continue through the whole of the Epiphanytide.

As we begin the new year as a church family, I also want to remind you of the challenge I gave at the Annual Meeting in December. With St. Timothy's 50th anniversary coming up in January 2024, how is God inviting us to celebrate that occasion with our ministries? How can we show the world around us the gift that our parish is meant to be in our lives and the life of our community? How can we grow more Christ-like as individuals and as a congregation? How can we show more of the love of Christ?

The Gospel of Matthew (2:1–12) speaks of Magi, or wise men, who followed a star from the East to Bethlehem in search of a newborn king. There they found Mary and the baby Jesus and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. As gentiles who acknowledged Christ's divinity, the Magi claim an essential role in the Epiphany, the manifestation of God to the world. Yet Matthew's brief description of the episode provides so few details about them that biblical scholars have had to speculate on their number, appearance, and origins.




COVER TO COVER Book Club






As December draws to a close the Outreach Committee would like to report the many things done just this month.

—\$400 was donated to DFACS for the purchase of Christmas gifts for children in foster care

-\$393.61 was donated to VAC "fill in" funds (usually we spend this money to "equal out" the gifts for family members due to more than one person buying for the same family but this year most of it went to sponsoring more children. Hurray!)

—We finished the Annual VAC Christmas Child Sponsorship with 11 families that included 26 children be-

ing sponsored by our church family. Thank you.

And finally, our Undesignated Fund totaled \$222.67, we chose to use this money in a much more hands on way. We went to Providence Missions Thrift store and paid for peoples purchases until the money ran out. Most purchases were clothes. The disbelief that someone would do that for them specially with no strings attached was met with smiles, tears and hugs. Many blessings were passed back and forth. The purchases in particular stand out to me was a little girl and her grandmother who came in to buy baby clothes for the girls' doll because that's all



the grandmother could afford. Also a young man who had been living in his car in Kroger's parking lot for the last three weeks. He had a job interview with Kroger's and was supposed to go in the next day, he thought it meant he got the job and wasn't sure. He wanted to make sure he had something to wear. When I told him he would need at least one change of clothes and go back and get some more because today my church was paying for them, he just starting crying and said there is still hope for him. I prayed with him before he left. Lastly, an older homeless man who came in stating all his clothes got flooded out from under the bridge so he had to get something to wear. He chose a short sleeve Hawaiian shirt and short and underclothes, when I asked him why shorts and short sleeve, he said he didn't have much money and they were cheap. That is when I was able to tell him St. Timothy's Outreach was paying for his purchases today and to go get something warm because it was supposed to be getting colder in the next couple day. His face lit up and he had such a genuine smile. That was the best and most rewarding morning I have ever spent.

Seeing people get excited and breakdown in tears over a purchase of \$5 of clothing for them makes you humble indeed.

We are the missionaries of our church, St. Timothy's. When you can - step in and help.
