**CITIZEN OF THE WEEK** - In a recent DALTON DAILY CITIZEN article, Kerry Dunbar was highlighted for his nearly thirty years of involvement in local environmental projects.

"Each year, he serves as one of the site coordinators for the annual Conasauga River Watershed Cleanup," noted John Lugthart, a biology professor at Dalton State College. "He has led volunteers in picking up litter, removing invasive plants and placing protective tubes around newly planted native trees."

Kerry's involvement doesn't end there. He helped establish the college's recycling program, volunteers with the Roadrunner Trail System, and recruiting more volunteers from the students. "His lack of fear of getting his hands dirty in the field" was noted by Amy Hartline, ED of Keep Dalton Whitfield Beautiful.



Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, occurring six and a half weeks before Easter (between February 4 and March 11, depending on the date of Easter). Ash Wednesday is a solemn reminder of human mortality and the need for reconciliation with God and marks the beginning of the penitential Lenten season. It is commonly observed with ashes and fasting. This year it will be celebrated on Wednesday, Feb. 14.

In the early Christian church, the length of the Lenten celebration varied, but eventually it began 6 weeks (42 days) before Easter. This provided only 36 days of fasting (excluding Sundays). In the 7th century, 4 days were added before the first Sunday in Lent in order to establish 40 fasting days, in imitation of Jesus Christ's fast in the desert.

The Ash Wednesday liturgy is possibly the most meaningful liturgy in our Book of Common Prayer. It offers us an opportunity to stop, reflect on who we are and whose we are, adopt an attitude of humility, hit the reset button, and begin again. We are invited to stop the whirlwind of life and activities that surround us on all sides and remember: God hates nothing God has made; God forgives the sins of all who are penitent; our God is the "God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness." As if all this in the opening collect is not enough, the reminder that we "are dust, and to dust [we] shall return" ought to put our life in Christ into a proper perspective of humility.

# DO YOU WANT TO FAST THIS LENT!

In the words of Pope Francis

- · Fast from hurting words and say kind words.
- · Fast from sadness and be filled with gratitude.
- · Fast from anger and be filled with patience.
- · Fast from pessimism and be filled with hope.
- · Fast from worries and have trust in God.
- · Fast from complaints and contemplate simplicity.
- · Fast from pressures and be prayerful.
- · Fast from bitterness and fill your hearts with
- · Fast from selfishness and be compassionate to others.
- · Fast from grudges and be reconciled.
- · Fast from words and be silent so you can listen.

This is made visible and tangible with the imposition of ashes from last year's Palm Sunday palms, which seem to retrace the Baptismal Cross on our foreheads as a reminder of the promises we make each time we renew our Baptismal Covenant: to participate in the full life of the Body of Christ, his Church; to say we are sorry whenever we have violated our relationships with God and others, all others; that everything we do and say will proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ; that we will seek and serve Christ in all persons; that we will strive for justice and peace for all people, and respect the dignity of every human being.



# NOT ALL STORMS COME TO DISRUPT SOME CLEAR YOUR PATH




